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## MONROE PARKS EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

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## THE TASK AT HAND

CARBO Landscape Architecture was selected to complete a Master Plan for three large parks in Monroe: Charles Johnson Park, Chennault Park, and Forsythe Park. The first steps in this process were gathering information, talking with stakeholders, and mapping key features, boundaries, and visible infrastructure for each park. CARBO also met with other designers and architects who were working on similar studies of downtown Monroe and the Community Centers.


After the initial stakeholder meetings, on-site research and data collection, the design team created an online survey and hosted community engagement events to gather information from the residents of Monroe on how they would like to use their parks. The information collected from stakeholders, research, and the community then informed an initial concept for each park. CARBO returned to Monroe to review the concept plans to confirm the plans reflected the community's vision. Comments were then collected and incorporated into the final plans. The master plan for each park will provide the City with a road map of implementable improvements that work in concert with the rapid improvements currently ongoing in the City.




The plan created for each park is a culmination of 9 months of community and stakeholder engagement. At each touch-point with the community, CARBO aimed to pull stories of the past and visions for the future.

**TODAY** each park serves their adjacent communities at varying levels of success. Charles Johnson Park provides walking paths, exercise equipment, and some opportunities for play without any meaningful connection to the Louisiana Purchase Gardens and Zoo and surrounding neighborhoods. Chennault Park, though largest in land area, is the least programmed and least utilized of the three parks. Forsythe Park is a hub for recreation and activity with close proximity to downtown. Its heavy use often leads to heavy vehicular traffic and unsafe pedestrian conditions.

Through an accelerated timeline and open dialogue with City officials and the public, a vision for each park has been articulated and will serve to guide future development.





## MASTER PLAN GOALS



#### **ORGANIZE PARK ELEMENTS**

This is achieved by...

- **Clustering like uses:** Examples of this practice include grouping the active sports together such Baseball, Softball, and Soccer while maintaining large natural areas for more passive uses such as picnicking.
- Improving safety and efficiency through circulation: Utilizing one-way roads to eliminate the use of the parks as cut-through routes, limiting vehicular access to the perimeter of each park, and separating vehicular and pedestrian routes.



#### **ENHANCE IDENTITY**

This is achieved by...

- **Embracing the adjacent community:** The park elements employed in each park should serve the daily users and neighborhoods adjacent to each park. Past, present, and future user groups were all considered during the master plan process.
- Reinforcing each park as a destination: Park elements such as iconic play structures, architecture, and event spaces should be unique to each park to further the park's identity within the culturally rich city fabric of Monroe.



#### PRIORITIZE PROGRAMMING

This is achieved by...

- **Reducing Redundancies:** In an effort for each park to have its own unique identity, redundant uses among the three parks were recommended for elimination, where appropriate. Certain uses, such as hosting events and improving areas for play, serve their adjacent communities at varying scales, justifying their duplication. When uses are duplicated, they are done in a way that offers a varied experience from park to park.
- **Providing a variety of activities:** Each park is intended to offer a different experience, through a variety of uses and stylized elements. During the public engagement events, the design team aimed to pull stories, nostalgia, challenges, and opportunities for each park! A variety of activities ensures each park is ACTIVATED by a variety of users. Increased user-ship means increased safety and overall quality of life for the citizens of Monroe.
- Addressing Existing Needs: The Master Plan for each park, while forward-thinking, will only be considered successful if they meet the needs of the community today.

## INFO GATHERING

After a kick-off meeting with the Department of Community Affairs, the Parks Division, and the Mayor's office, the design team began gathering GIS data for each park. During the team's visit to conduct stakeholder meetings, in depth site visits were conducted at each park to better understand existing conditions and how the parks are used daily.

#### **CHARLES JOHNSON PARK**

Charles Johnson Park is the smallest of the three destination parks, but serves as the largest park for the surrounding community. The park features expansive green spaces, playgrounds, and highly used walking trails. Many neighborhood events are held at the park including cross country and track, cultural festivals and markets, and family cook-outs. Charles Johnson Park is bordered on one side by the Louisiana Purchase Gardens and Zoo and on two sides by a large deep drainage canal.

#### **CHENNAULT PARK**

At roughly 950 acres, Chennault Park is the largest of the three parks. It is currently home to the Northeast African American Heritage Museum, an 18 hole public golf course, the Northeast Louisiana Soccer Association complex, two 18-hole disc golf courses, horse shoes, three ponds, tennis courts, dated play equipment, acres of forested area, and open lawn space beneath mature trees. The property is divided by a network of drainage swales with large swaths of forested wetlands. The park is most commonly used on a daily basis by golfers and disc golfers during the week and soccer on the weekends during the active season.

#### **FORSYTHE PARK**

Forsythe Park is a 40-acre urban park located adjacent to the historic Garden District neighborhood and has connectivity to Downtown Monroe. It has expansive green spaces, towering trees, and views from the river. The park offers a range of recreational amenities, including walking paths, picnic areas, tennis courts, golf course, soccer fields, a boat launch, and river access. With its diverse offerings, Forsythe Park serves as a popular destination for locals and visitors alike, providing a serene escape to enjoy nature and partake in various outdoor activities.

## STAKEHOLDER MEETINGS

Initial stakeholder meetings were held in October of 2022, conducted over three days at locations near each park. The team met with several groups representing multiple user types from the surrounding communities. 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## ONLINE SURVEY ROUND ONE

During the early info gathering phase, the design team created an online survey for each park to better understand how the parks are used regularly and the overall "feel." Signs with QR Codes were utilized along pathways or areas with high pedestrian traffic directing park patrons to the online survey. Public participation was indicative of the activity level in each park with the most responses gathered for Forsythe Park and the least with Chennault Park.

#### The questions posed for each park include:

- 1. In one word, please explain how you feel when in \_\_\_\_\_ Park.
- 2. What is your favorite feature of the park?
- 3. What feature do you think needs the most improvements?
- 4. What brought you out to the park today?
- 5. How often do you visit the park?

To conclude each survey, participants were provided with the information on the first public engagement events and an option to enter their email address to receive regular updates about the Master Plan progress.

## ENGAGEMENT ROUND ONE

#### **COMMUNITY VISION**

The first round of public engagement was kicked-off in late November/early December at two community events: Movie in the Park and the Annual Christmas Tree Lighting. The intent of the activities planned for these events was...

- 1. To invite the public into ongoing participation through a clear introduction of the forthcoming process
- 2. To capture the vision for each park that would inform the concept plans.

Activity boards with corresponding colors were displayed for constituents to respond and place what they would like to see in which park. In order to have each person prioritize where they would prefer certain program elements, each participant was limited to one sticker for each color. Children were encouraged to draw how they play or what they would like to see in their parks.





## **ENGAGEMENT ROUND TWO**

#### **REVEAL AT THE RIVER MARKET**

The design team provided two opportunities to collect public input as part of the second round of community engagement. The first was held at Saul Adler Community Center where the City and design team made a short presentation explaining the work that lead to the Concept Plans. The presentation was followed by a casual question and answer session.

The second event was held at the River Market as part of the events leading up to the Krewe de Riviere Parade. Feedback was collected through casual conversation as well in written form on sticky notes that were color coded or each park.

The concept plans showcased how program elements could be organized throughout each park. Improvements to pedestrian and vehicular circulation were considered in coordination with monthly and daily activities. Precedent imagery was used to illustrate the appropriate scale of design features as well as aesthetic/visual qualities.




#### PRIORITIZING SITE ACTIVATION

## **EXISTING CONDITIONS**

Charles Johnson Park is a beloved children's park located adjacent to the Louisiana Purchase Gardens & Zoo. The park is well-known for its scenic walking trails and large open spaces. However, the locations of the play structures are fragmented and the park lacks a cohesive design that would connect its various programming elements. Despite being a popular venue for a variety of festivals, including Cross Country showcases and Juneteenth celebrations, the park is currently lacking in essential amenities such as overhead structures, restrooms, and planned open space that would allow it to reach its full potential as an event space. Additionally, the park has inadequate lighting, which can make visitors feel unsafe. While Charles Johnson Park is beloved for its natural beauty and walking trails, it has room for improvement in terms of its design and amenities to better serve visitors and create a safe and welcoming environment for its users.











- A new disc golf courses
- Improved stormwater site strategies
- 3 new basketball courts
- New and improved restroom facilities



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## **MASTER PLAN**

The revised Charles Johnson Master Plan brings a much-needed level of organization and functionality to the beloved park by connecting programming elements with a new series of walking trails.

New program elements include:

- Fitness zone complete with accessible exercise equipment, 5 new basketball courts and a "yoga lawn"
- Great lawn
- Pecan orchard with overflow parking
- 2 brand new children's playgrounds
- 8 "party pavilions" with 1 large festival pavilion
- Enhanced stormwater management strategies that adhere to the sites existing topography

#### ENLARGEMENT

Two linear entry plazas, wide enough to host art and farmer's markets, have replaced the existing entries. These plazas direct visitors to a breathtaking view of the great lawn area, which acts as the hub of the park, with the ability to support a large stage for concerts and festival-sized crowds. Three new restroom facilities have been added, as well as eight small-scale "party pavilions" perfect for BBQs, birthday parties, or simply acting as shade structures with seating for large festivals. A new pedestrian entrance connected to the zoo leads directly to a giant Gumbo Pot play structure on the right and a naturalistic play area complete with a climbable catfish structure on the left.








- Improved walking paths with consideration to existing trees and optimum views




#### FUNCTIONAL LANDSCAPES

- Native plantings to provide ecological diversity, pollinator habitat, and a food source for wildlife






## **EXISTING CONDITIONS**

Chennault Park is home to large mature hardwoods and ample green space. As the largest area of the three parks studied, this park's biggest challenge was identified as its lack of consistent activation. The sprawling shaded lawns are largely underutilized. Several structures and facilities across the park, including the restrooms and shade structures, have gone into disrepair after years of neglect. In short, the park caters to the few that use it regularly: disc golfers, horse shoe players, and weekend soccer. The lack of updated facilities does not invite these users to stay any longer than needed and does not invite new users to the park. The natural setting positions the park to become a celebration of nature and family for the City of Monroe.





















## **CONCEPT PLAN**

The Concept Plan for Chennault Park is based on the feedback from the early community and stakeholders engagement along with the existing conditions analysis, and overall goals for all three parks. The major design moves at Chennault Park include:

- Improvements to main entrance circulation
- Consideration of an additional exit on Millhaven Rd
- Additional entrance/exit towards the northern-most portion of the park leading to Hwy 80
- Extensive trails system
- Sculpture Garden leading to NE LA African American Heritage Museum
- Large covered event space
- New picnic shelters
- Clustering play equipment
- Consolidation of disc golf courses
- Water access
- Enhanced soccer facilities
- Opportunity for multi-purpose fields
- Extreme sports park
- RV and Primitive Camping
















Chennault Park was centered around clustering active, more regularly used spaces near the existing park entrance off Millhaven Rd, and reserving the internal portions of the park for more passive uses to include camping and a day of golf. This allows these areas to be ticketed/ limited access when needed, and buffers them from the sounds of the lively front half of the

## **MASTER PLAN**

During the reveal of the draft plans for each park, one theme heard repeatedly for Chennault Park was the wish to have it activated once again as it was in its heyday. A survey circulated to stakeholders prioritized using Chennault for the following (listed from highest priority to lowest):

- Large Music Festival
- Golf Tournaments
- Fishing/Kayaking with Expanded Ponds
- Cultural/Arts Festivals
- Disc Golf Tournaments
- RV Camping + Tent Campground
- Church/Business Retreats (100+ people)
- Cabins
- Family Retreats (30+ people)
- **BMX Competitions**

In addition to hosting events, many golfers in the community mentioned that Chennault's golf course could be a great asset for the community with some added care and updated facilities; a perspective echoed by Golf Pro, Don Walters. Revenue generating activities for Chennault will allow for golf course updates and regular activation of the park.

#### ENLARGEMENT


The overall strategy for the Master Plan is to activate the core of the park, clustering similar uses. The areas that are proposed to be used more frequently are concentrated within the southern half of the park, closer to the existing entrance. This protects the natural environment of other areas of the park while activating areas near existing facilities: The Northeast Louisiana Delta African American Heritage Museum, Northeast Louisiana Soccer Association Fields, and Joe Delaney Memorial Monument.


The northern portion of the park is intended to support the Golf Course on the west and proposed camp grounds to the east.

The enlargement shows how event spaces can support one another through shared parking and pedestrian circulation. Events held in the southern portion of the park can be monitored or ticketed, limiting vehicular circulation during large events and allowing for a safer pedestrian experience.









#### **PLAYGROUNDS**

- Adventure Playground using a mix of natural and manufactured materials
- Natural obstacle course to provide challenges for children and adults alike
- Zip lines and other play pieces can continue the extreme sports theme of the park introduced by the BMX Trails and pump track while catering to varying levels of ability




#### **FLEXIBLE GREEN SPACE**

- Bradburry Park in Brisbane, Australia provides a scooter track set within the park setting of lawn and trees
- Blue Hole Regional Park in Georgetown, Texas makes use of passive green space near the water's edge
- Hammocks throughout the park can be utilized by children and adults; these could be clustered near high activity areas





#### **EVENT SPACES**

- The Josey Pavilion in Decatur, TX is a fantastic example of an outdoor pavilion that makes use of natural wood and other simple materials for a striking site facility
- Hilltop Arboretum in Baton Rouge, LA is another example of the successful use of simple materials to provide an event pavilion space in a naturalistic setting
- The shelters at Railroad Park in Birmingham, AL also share the character of simple forms and materials used for outdoor gathering space; this type of pavilion could be replicated throughout Chennault if the existing shelters were phased out
















#### WALKING AND BIKING TRAILS

- Multi-use paths throughout the Park offer walking, jogging, and biking paths for a variety of experiences and through meadows and nomow areas and provide a variety of experiences along Millhaven Rd.
- Similar to Storm King Art Center in upstate New York, large scale sculptures could be placed along paths originating at the NE LA Delta African American Museum and extending toward the proposed Multi-Use Pavilion with high visibility from Millhaven Rd
- The path network could extend along and through the wooded areas of the site



#### PRIMITIVE AND RV CAMP SITES

- The Fort Wilderness Resort as part of Disney World is a large scale example of thoughtful RV and tent camping sites; the goal for Chennault is to make use of existing utility hook-ups/ infrastructure
- Another goal for the campsites at Chennault is to provide planted buffers between campsites and to disturb as little of the natural environment as possible
- Large outdoor gathering amenities, such as the table shown in the last image, would provide for the needs expressed by the Community within Chennault



#### **ACTIVITIES ON THE WATER**


- By connecting and expanding the existing ponds, the Park opens itself to greater use by kayaks, canoes, and the fishing community.
- A kayak launch should be considered for ease of access to the ponds once expanded
- The expansion of the ponds can provide a scenic backdrop at the Multi-Use Pavilion and the Camping Community Center
















#### **EXTREME SPORTS PARK**

- BMX Trails through the woods are proposed adjacent to the existing soccer fields to cluster active uses together and to share amenities; Chennault's existing forested canopy offers a unique trail experience if completed with minimal clearing
- The scooter track at Bradburry Park is a great example of form, function, and materials that has been borrowed for the pump/scooter track planned between the green space that links the future soccer clubhouse to the adventure playground
- Keeping consistent with other proposed materials across the site, the BMX Trails could make use of natural materials, such as wood, where applicable




- Proposed updates to the existing soccer fields include a pedestrian promenade linking the fields to other parts of the site and to future sports facilities

## **EXISTING CONDITIONS**

Forsythe Park is a historic park within Monroe's Garden District and serves many functions for the surrounding community. Over the years the park has been claimed by many uses including softball, baseball, golf, pick-up soccer games, track practice, and tennis to name a few. These activities have slowly eaten away at the limited remaining passive spaces of the park and inched closer to the delicate canopy and root system of the beloved mature live oaks. Outdated play equipment once served the community well but has fallen into disrepair. Poor drainage also plagues the park, limiting how much of the remaining green space is used following a storm event. The park is also directly adjacent to the Ouachita River, but provides limited connections to riverside activities. Walls, berming, and visual clutter have limited visibility into the park creating either physical or visible barriers. When coupled with outdated site amenities, park users are subject to increased risk and the potential for injury.



## **CONCEPT PLAN**

The initial concept for Forsythe Park worked to organize and cluster similarly programmed elements in an effort to protect and celebrate the park's identity and history. During the community engagement and stakeholder meetings, there was a great need identified for this park to host community and civic events. Safe pedestrian circulation was also critical to park users, so this concept seeks to limit vehicular circulation through the heart of the park. Another challenge for this concept was planning for future projects slated to occur within the park to include: the Children's Museum, Tennis Court Expansion and Clubhouse, and expansion of the Water Treatment Facilities. While providing space for all the park's current and future uses, the concept also engages the local art community through a sculpture lawn that draws the eye and the visitor along the park's east-west axis from the existing natatorium to the new riverside access.







































#### PARK ORGANIZATION



The overall goal is to organize and cluster like elements in the park while keeping the parks core open and accessible with passive programing elements to optimize pedestrian circulation.

## MASTER PLAN

Expanding on the initial concept, the Master Plan defines Forsythe's identity by embracing its history. This plan aims to achieve three overall objectives; enhanced safety, accessibility, and sustainability.

**Safety:** The reconfiguration of Sycamore Ave. reduces the speed that vehicular traffic passes through the park and limits the interaction between vehicles and pedestrians. Removing visual clutter and outdated structures also contribute to the safety of the visitors. Clustering elements with similar uses helps open up views into the park, allowing visibility to and from the adjacent neighborhoods.

Accessibility: Safe pedestrian circulation is a critical component of the master plan. Prioritizing pedestrians in the core of the park through a series of walkways connected to the surrounding neighborhoods and park elements creates a comfortable and accessible experience for visitors. This plan provides a safe, accessible route for visitors to experience both the river and the park.

Sustainability: Reconfiguring the existing golf course to a par-3 course allows both the water treatment facilities to expand, and the opportunity to capture, treat and store stormwater runoff, helping to alleviate the pressures on the current city drainage system. Opening up this area also allows for an expansion of the park's walking trails and educational opportunities.

#### ENLARGEMENT

Reconnecting the park to the Ouachita River is instrumental to the success of the park and the Master Plan. Suffering from the effect of the constructed levee, the park has become disconnected, allowing facilities located on the other side to fall into a state of disrepair since being out of site. Because this is the only public park with river access in Monroe, the master plan proposes to prioritize the focus on recreational activities, such as an improved kayak launch, a sand beach, walking trails, bird-watching viewing platforms, and a seeded meadow to reduce the maintenance responsibilities.

The grand gesture for this side of the park is reworking the edges of the barrow-pits remnants to create a more experiential course for visitors and increase the wildlife habitat at the aquatic edge. This will allow visitors an option for either fishing, kayaking, or paddle boarding near the river, but without fear of the current.

The following pages provide supporting imagery and graphics to further illustrate the design intent.



#### **PROMENADES**




#### SMALL AND LARGE GATHERING SPACES








### ART IN THE PARK








### **ACTIVITIES ON THE WATER**











### LARGE FESTIVALS

Each park has been designed to hold large festivals at differing scales relative to their size. Chennault Park being the largest is designed to hold the largest gatherings and is able to accommodate roughly 4,575 people with 3 or 4 different stage areas. Charles Johnson Park is designed to accommodate right around 4,000 people in the grand lawn, 1,000 people on the yoga lawn, and a stage/utility hook-ups for a stage at each. Forsythe Park is designed to accommodate just under 1,000 people at the natatorium turned amphitheater and an additional 1,000 people on the open lawn space.








### CROSS COUNTRY/TRACK

During the stakeholder meeting and community engagement events, there was mention of how cross country and track teams use each park currently. It was important to the design team that these uses were accommodated at each park. Charles Johnson has successfully hosted cross country meets and other recreational races in the past. Cross country meets have been a challenge to host at Chennault Park in the past due to scheduling conflicts. With minor grading improvements, Chennault Park could prove to be a scenic setting for cross country meets. With each phased implementation of both Charles Johnson and Chennault's designs, both parks would offer a wide variety of running experiences.

Forsythe Park had not previously hosted any cross country meets to the knowledge of the design team; however, local school track teams currently use the park for practice. Additionally, many races start and stop at the park throughout the year. By clustering uses, and preserving open green space, the master plan provides ample room to safely continue track practice and to host races.







### PICK-UP GAMES/DISC GOLF

Each park master plan has been designed for diversity, flexibility, and adaptability to allow for different intensities of use to occur both daily and seasonally. Healthy, active parks are able to adapt over time and open green spaces within our three destination parks will allow for spontaneous and unprogrammed events to suit their surrounding communities and aid in regular activation.

In some parks the design team added more opportunities for impromptu games to occur such as at Charles Johnson Park where five basketball courts were added along with a gently sloping lawn. Forsythe Park acts much like the Garden District's shared backyard where people would meet regularly to play soccer without any formal field markings. Not only has green space been preserved in Forsythe Park to continue to promote these activities, but drainage improvements are also proposed to ensure that these spaces dry quicker following rain events.

Disc golfers have consistently used Chennault Park for tournaments and the master plan intends to continue that use by providing two 18-hole disc golf courses with slight modifications from their current layout.








### **COMMUNITY & NEIGHBORHOOD EVENTS**

In addition to the larger festival events for each site, a need for smaller events was voiced for each park during community engagement. Charles Johnson and Forsythe Parks are both important gathering spaces to their adjacent neighborhoods. The proposed improvements at each provide site amenities to continue the rich cultural traditions at each park with multiple pavilions to rent at Charles Johnson Park and the tennis clubhouse and open lawn spaces available to rent at Forsythe Park.

The existing shelters at Chennault Park have long been used for family reunions, church and business retreats, and birthday parties. These uses have decreased in recent years as the shelters have fallen into disrepair. Updating the shelters and providing new amenities such as new play equipment and bathrooms coupled with an updated golf clubhouse could make Chennault Park a highly sought after event venue space.

These amenities can also serve to generate revenue for each park that can in turn fund maintenance and future improvements.







### STORMWATER DETENTION

Each site is designed to manage site stormwater at varying scales. In doing so, drainage improvements allow for a quicker return of use to each park following a rain event and the introduction of stormwater best management practices provides an educational opportunity. By daylighting these systems, Monroe residents are able to experience natural processes in their community parks.

Charles Johnson Park provided ample opportunities to highlight how the site drains and deals with stormwater. A common theme when implementing best management practices is to slow the draining of stormwater, allowing for sediment and impurities to filter out of the water and to recharge the groundwater table. Rain gardens are used near children's play areas for increased exposure to natural systems and a network of boardwalks allows residents to venture through the areas of the site that will experience differing levels of inundation.

Similarly, Forsythe Park makes use of some of the decommissioned golf course to provide ample storage for stormwater with a series of boardwalks linking high points to the overall site circulation.

The strategy at Chennault was to protect existing forested wetlands and drainage-ways that are critical to the overall function and ecosystems surrounding the park.








### **SECURITY MEASURES/CONSIDERATIONS**

Integral to the proposed improvements at each park were security measures and safety considerations of users. Improvements include increased park lighting, safe water access/viewing, increased views into and out of each park, buffering people during work-outs, separating pedestrian circulation from vehicular, and enclosing children's play areas through the use of planting and low fencing. Each park master plan also put thoughtful consideration into how access can be effectively limited or ticketed during events and how best to restrict vehicular traffic from festival and heavy pedestrian-use spaces.







### **DECREASED MAINTENANCE**

Landscape maintenance costs can be a large percentage of the overall budget for parks. By decreasing mowing at each of Monroe's largest parks, the Parks Division is able to spend less on maintenance and ideally put more into park facilities and amenities. These diagrams illustrate the large swaths of parkland that is proposed to be converted to areas that is mowed once annually (meadows) or not at all (forested areas).

There is no such thing as zero maintenance landscapes. Once established, meadow and other native habitats require lower maintenance when compared to traditional planting beds and lawns. Establishing a mature meadow takes around 3 years and may require regular weeding, re-seeding, and mowing or controlled burns to achieve a satisfactory establishment.

Soil conditions and fluctuating inundation levels will determine the plant palette selected for each meadow habitat. Consulting with a professional to determine ideal species will ensure the seed mix tolerates the conditions specific to each site.
